FROM THE PRINCIPALS

Last Friday we participated in National Tree Day with students from both schools planting new trees and bush tucker plants around the grounds. With our school focus on environmental and sustainability awareness it was fabulous to see the care with which the students tended the new additions to the school grounds.

At the end of 2018 the Government announced that it would open a Centre for Excellence in Literacy. The Centre is a partnership between the Department of Education and Curtin University and is intended to improve literacy teaching across the WA public school sector. We are delighted to have been successful in our selection as one of 20 schools to participate in the first round of funding for this project. Emma Lipscombe has been selected as our 'literacy ambassador' and will be participating in a rigorous professional learning program which also provides support for classroom teachers across our school to further develop their skills in the explicit teaching of literacy. We will also be seeking to support other neighbouring schools in developing their capacity in this area as well. Explicit teaching is defined as teachers being clear about what they want students to know and be able to do by the end of each lesson. Teachers tell students what they need to do, show them how to do it, and give them time to practise what they have learnt. Emma and I will be attending the Launch of this exciting initiative in Week 5 and we look forward to updating you on our progress with the program.

Term 3 will another busy and eventful term with our Athletics season about to start. This year Mosman Park Primary will also be hosting the Interschool Athletics Carnival.

NATIONALLY CONSISTENT COLLECTION OF DATA ON SCHOOL STUDENTS WITH DISABILITY (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD).

The national data collection ensures that information about students with disability is transparent, consistent and reliable at a national level.

The following information is collected for each student receiving an adjustment due to disability:

- year of schooling
- level of adjustment provided
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional

The broad type of disability and the level of adjustment are determined through consultation with parents and carers, observations and professional judgments, medical and professional diagnosis and other relevant information.

Students with learning difficulties (such as dyslexia or auditory processing disorder) or chronic health conditions (like epilepsy or diabetes) that require monitoring and the provision of adjustments may be included.

The data is used to inform funding and to help teachers better support students with disability to take part in school on the same basis as other students.

No identifying information or personal details are provided to the Australian Government in the NCCD.

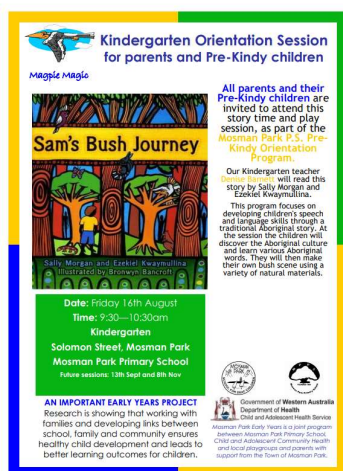

TECH TALK 8 - Full STEAM Ahead!



Science week is in Term 3, week 4 and to celebrate MPPS will be having a STEAM day on Wednesday the 14th of August. All students from P-6 will be involved! The students will be rotating around different STEAM themed activities. We welcome any parents or community members to join in and help out on this exciting day. Please let Jess Anderson or your child's teacher know if you are available or interested.

STEM Projects to try at home:

Invisible Ink: When life gives you lemons, make a secret message from invisible ink! Mail it to a friend or relative, include tips on how it works, and let them bring the image or note to light!

WHAT YOU'LL NEED: 1 lemon, cotton swab, sheet of white paper, sun, iron, or lightbulb

WHAT TO DO: 1. Squeeze the lemon juice into a bowl and add a spoonful of water. Mix gently. Dip the swab into the liquid and write a message or draw a picture on the paper.

2. Let the liquid dry completely so that the message or picture is invisible. To share your secret, set it in sunlight, hold close to a lightbulb, or iron (with adult help).

3. The message will be revealed! Hang it as artwork or share it with a friend.

Diluting or adding water to the lemon juice makes it very hard to see when you apply it to the paper, but lemon juice is an organic substance that oxidizes and turns brown when it's heated up. This means that no one will notice that the secret is there until the paper is heated and the message is revealed! Other substances that work in the same way include orange juice, honey diluted with water, milk, onion juice, and vinegar. *Technologies Specialist, Jess Anderson*
