## FROM THE PRINCIPALS

'Inspirational!'

That was the word our Director General Lisa Rodgers used to describe what she saw when she came to our Auslan day last week. At a school where inclusion of our Deaf students seems like a very normal and natural thing, you may wonder why we need a day to celebrate the language of the Deaf. It's all about learning valuable lessons from the past.

In years gone by there have been many changes to Deaf Education. At one stage Deaf teachers taught Deaf children in their own language and Deaf students were thriving. Then at an international conference in Milan in 1880, it was decided (by hearing people) that sign language was inferior to spoken language and suddenly it was banned! Deaf teachers lost their jobs and deaf children were forced to sit on their hands (literally!) and try to understand their world by lip reading. As sign language is a complete and natural language, and communication is a basic human need, sign language never went away. Deaf communities still came together as a cultural community built on a shared language. But Deaf children's education certainly suffered. Deaf students no longer achieved at the previous levels and their mental health was negatively impacted. It was a long and hard struggle to come back from this dark and limiting mindset in a world where Deaf people had no voice.

So now we celebrate the fact that our students can learn in a bilingual/bicultural environment where their language and culture is not only accepted, but celebrated. We now have our students proudly using Auslan to grow and develop and we have firmly embedded the ethos of 'Deaf kids CAN!!' Our children are now able to understand their world in a natural way and more and more people are learning this beautiful language.

So why do we have Auslan Day? To celebrate how far the world has come in Deaf Education and remember never to go back there. Our kids are now thriving in a world where Deafness is not seen as a disability and when you see our kids in operation at an event like Auslan Day, I am sure you will agree with our Director General when she says these kids are indeed 'Inspirational!'
